
DENNIS SCHLABACH, of Denco, dies at 84

Dennis E. Schlabach was born in Berlin, Ohio, on May 31, 1937. As a young adult, he held several jobs, including working at a meat processing plant, driving a bread truck, and washing cars at Village Motors. While selling cars, he met Emanuel Mullet of Wayne Door, and the rest is history.

Schlabach joined Wayne Door as a salesman in 1960 and began a successful career in the garage door industry; an industry in which he achieved professional and personal triumphs, and, most importantly, where he made lifelong friendships.

In 1967, Schlabach founded Denco Marketing, a wholesale distributor of garage follow through and serve their needs, and a good joke or two when he called their business," said Kathy Schlabach.

Known by association


An active member of the International Door Association (IDA), Schlabach served on the board of directors from 1996 to 2001 and also served as treasurer for over five years. He was also a founding contributor to the IDA Scholarship Fund.

Former Managing Director of IDEA and IDA Todd Thomas said, "Dennis seemed to give away more products than he sold. His generosity knew no bounds. He personified generosity." Thomas said that Schlabach

was not only generous with products, but he was also generous with his time, sharing ideas and strategies, as well as mentoring those new to the industry. He wrote and produced the Successful Business Images program, specifically designed for door dealerships.

Schlabach was a loving husband, dad, grandfather, and friend. He enjoyed golfing and traveling, and he was a lifelong Cleveland Browns and Indians fan. He was 11 the last time the Indians won a national championship, but he never gave up the hope they would do it again.
