Thief's Prized Item: GDO Remote

a thief who steals GDO remotes so he can return later and gain easy access into homes.

In one case, the thief used a block to break the car window and take only the remote. Police believe the same man broke into other cars and homes in Encino. Most of the burglaries happened in the morning.

Police are urging homeowners to hide or remove remotes from their cars when they park on the street.

Editor's Note: If a car is parked outside, the vulnerable remote control is essentially a key to the house. We recommend that dealers inform their customers of the danger and offer mini-keychain transmitters as a potential solution.

GDO Remotes Used in String of St. Louis Burglaries

At least four times in two weeks, suspects used stolen GDO remote controls to get into homes in the St. Charles suburb of St. Louis.

In one case, the burglar walked through the first floor of the house as several family members were asleep. The burglar took a handgun, an iPad, a PlayStation 3, and a wallet. The burglar gained access by using a remote taken from an unlocked car.

Police encouraged homeowners to lock car doors, bring the remote inside, and make sure the door is locked between the garage and the home. *Editor's Note: These "thefts by remote" continue throughout the country. Door*
